



Summary of Financial Audit

The Tidwell Group performed our Single Agency Audit for the year ended December 31, 2021. They spent approximately one week at the agency auditing our major programs and internal controls, compliance, financial management and all applicable federal laws. This audit had no findings and no questioned costs.

Energy Outreach and Weatherization

PICCA continues to serve home owners and renters in Pickaway County with home repair and energy conservation services using funds from the Ohio Development Services Agency, Ohio Partners for Affordable Energy, Energy Partnership Program, Columbia Gas Warm Choice Program, USDA Rural Development and the Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging. With additional funding we have been able to keep many homes from being deferred. We have served well over 100 clients in 2021 and look forward to exceeding our goals in 2022. As cost rise in labor and materials we work diligently to serve as many clients as possible in all areas of energy conservation for their homes as we can.

Utility Assistance Programs

Through our Energy Assistance Programs like HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program), we were able to help **1,178** total households throughout Pickaway County with **1,008** of those served through our Winter and Summer Crisis programs. In addition, we distributed 83 window A/C units through our partnership with Grainger and 176 box fans...

Pandemic-related Rent, Mortgage and Utility Assistance

PICCA served **662** households served (1,711 individuals) with over **\$1.1M** spent. Various providers of funding including U.S. Department of Treasury, Ohio Department of Development, Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging and the Ohio Housing Finance Agency. In late 2021, PICCA partnered with the Circleville Municipal Court to mediate between landlords and tenants and connect tenants facing eviction to the rental assistance programs available. This partnership prevented over 30 evictions of tenants who had never applied for any type of public assistance prior to the pandemic.

Transportation

Last year we drove **87,239** miles for 2021. **22,019** total trips for 2021. **3,648** trips were for medical appointments with **20,193** miles. **882** trips were for taking clients to work with **4,746** miles. **4,411** trips were for taking children to school with **34,342** miles. **8,373** trips were for taking general public with **26,227** miles. **4,705** trips were for clients in wheelchairs with 1,731 miles.

Housina

In 2021 PICCA owned and managed three rental complexes totaling **95** units and **12** single family homes in Pickaway County. Through our housing programs, we were able to house **5** homeless veterans, and **6** battered women in our agency apartments. As well as continue with our partnership with the Pickaway County Board of DD in administering housing for **16** individuals throughout the community.



COMMUNITY SERVICES

Fresh Produce Market

PICCA Fresh Produce Market distributed **138,681** pounds of produce in 2021. This was enough produce to serve **119,517** meals. In total **13,216** individuals were served in 2021, with **1,028** of these people new to the program.

Veterans Transitional Living

In 2021 the Veterans Transitional Housing program helped **45** single males/females receive housing in 2021. Nine families were housed in the transitional housing apartments. Thirty -five individuals secured safe/permanent housing, with over half securing some type of monthly income before exit. On average participants stayed **61** days before securing housing.

Triple S Wellness Program

In 2021 PICCA introduced the Triple S Wellness program for people in recovery.

79 individuals were entered into the program, which exceeded the expectation of 30 individuals. The program provided safe, engaging and sober activities for its participants. These activities included; self-care, painting, pottery, tubing, kayaking, cooking class, zip lining and many more exciting adventures.

Toys for Tots

For the 2021 holiday season Toys for Tots raised the income eligibility from **125%** percent of federal poverty line to **175%**. The program also begin operating out of the Ohio Street Annex offering toy pickup five days a week. Clients were also given the ability to digitally send needed documents in advance of their visit. Throughout the holiday season, the program provided toys to approximately **950** children, most notably serving twice as many infants/toddlers than the year prior.





HEAD START / EARLY HEAD START

Community Needs Each year we assess the needs of children and families in our community. The most challenging need this year was how to provide services both in person and remotely in the time of a pandemic. We shifted our focus to provide services remotely. We used several online media options to be able to connect with families and provide services. We held

weekly Zoom sessions with children enrolled in Head Start and our Home based option for Early Head Start and provided weekly porch drops of materials, food and supplies.

Due to COVID, we put some restrictions in place for best practice to keep our children, their families and our staff safe. Most classrooms started with around 10 kids per classroom, and were placed in classrooms based off of their address so we could bus each classroom together. We did a staggered start time to allow for one classroom at a time in hallways and common areas to keep the risk of cross-exposing children at a minimum. Based off of CDC and ODH recommendations, we did daily temperature checks on all staff and children. Anyone found to be ill was requested to leave and not return until they were fever free for a minimum of 24 hours, and to seek medical advice when necessary.


While we were able to serve all eligible children both in class and remotely, we know in-person learning is best. Our goal for next school year is to go back to providing all services in person while ensuring the health and safety of everyone.



Our Early Head Start and Head Start programs assisted families in scheduling and keeping well child visits, as well as updating their immunizations according to the EPSDT. Our Health Manager and Health Specialist completed vision, hearing, dental and nutrition screenings on all children enrolled longer than 45 days.

Staff Wellness and COVID-19

Based on our current grant goal to nurture a culture of health and safety for staff, our staff wellness committee chose to focus each month on a different wellness activity and try to make time for our staff to decompress, and reduce stress and fatigue that is caused from working with families in poverty. As an early childhood program, we care about our staff and know that if they are not healthy and taking care of themselves it makes it increasingly difficult for them to care for others. COVID-19 continued through this past program year causing classrooms to

be quarantined, staff and children to be out of classrooms and even forced one classroom to be virtual for a while due to staffing shortages. Our staff responded to the COVID-19 pandemic and worked harder and more diligently than ever to find creative ways to keep themselves, classrooms and buses that transport our kids safe and healthy.



Dental exams for the 2021-2022 program year were challenging. We had 72 completed dentals exams which showed that 35% of children saw a dentist and 65% did not. Many dental offices did not want to see new patients or would not allow parents to go back with their child so appointments were not completed. We also did not have the opportunity to do a Give Kids a Smile Day which helps get our students seen by a dentist. COVID affected the health and wellness of our vulnerable children and we are working side by side with parents to help children enrolled get up to date with their primary health care and dental needs.



The COVID pandemic continued to create challenges in the areas of enrollment and staffing during the 2021-2022 program year. Head Start completed the year with **164** students out of a possible **212** or **77%** enrollment. Early Head Start completed the year with **64** enrollees out of our allotted **72** or **89%** enrollment. The Early Head Start classroom of **8** remained at full enrollment throughout the school year. Recruitment of staff has been successful and we are working to meet the training requirements for all new team members. Recruitment of children remains a priority as we work towards the goals of the full enrollment initiatives produced by the Office of Head Start for the 2022-23 school year.

EHS Waiting List:

We ended the program year with **15** children on the Home Visiting waitlist with **9** of those **15** being over-income and **6** income eligible for the program. There were **41** children on the EHS Infant-Toddler Classroom waitlist of which **15** were considered over-income and **36** were determined to be income eligible for Early Head Start.

The home visiting program had to hire two new home visitors at the end of the program year so staffing had a direct impact on enrollment. Home Visiting is on target to have newly hired staff members trained and on target to reach full enrollment by early fall 2022.

Transitions:

16 EHS children will be transitioning on to preschool. **14** will move on to our Head Start program and **2** of the **16** will be moving on to another preschool option.

Serving Children with Special Needs:

25 or **22%** of all enrolled Early Head Start children had an Individualized Family Services Plan (IFSP). EHS recognizes and appreciates the very important collaboration of services we have with the Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Early Intervention and Help Me Grow for children ages birth to three with an IFSP.

42 or **20%** of all enrolled Head Start children had and Individual Education Plan (IEP). It is through our strong relationships with Circleville City, Logan Elm, Teays Valley and Westfall School Districts that we are able to identify and support families with children who have special needs. We contract with a Speech and Language Pathologist who provides intervention services to children identified through screenings, teacher observations and family concerns. The schools provide iterant teachers, speech and language therapy for children on an IEP.

Activities for transition included: children toured their new school and meeting teaching staff, books and handouts were given to families about kindergarten, Kindergarten teachers visited the centers and spent time with each child's HS teacher getting to know the children, and in summer 2021 HS offered a three-week summer program in July for children to help refresh and build their skills for kindergarten.

Serving Children with Special Needs

We are able to serve children with an identified disability without regard to their family income.

Head Start Services

Our Head Start program has strong relationships with Circleville City School District, Logan Elm District, Teays Valley School District, and Westfall School District to serve preschool children with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Support services can be provided in all Head Start Classrooms. We contract with a Speech and Language Pathologist who provides intervention for children identified

family concerns. The schools provide for Itinerant teachers, speech and language therapy, and occupational and physical therapy services as prescribed on children's IEP.



COMMUNICATIONS

Communications efforts proved to be just as vital in 2021 as it was during the height of the pandemic. Clients regularly visited the picca.info website, seeing a total of **17,000** visitors. The PICCA Facebook page saw continued growth, with a **24%** increase over 2020, reaching over **63,000** people.



On Facebook the Fresh Produce Market was the most popular topic of conversation with most posts reaching thousands of people. The top post for the year reached over **16,000** people.



PICCA regularly put out video content on Facebook, Instagram and YouTube. The animated video Dinosaur Stories, written by Head Start students, reached **1.8K** people and showed high levels of engagement and comment. Special videos like the construction of PICCA's Community Greenhouse reached **1.1K** people.
